

Today's speaker, Rosie Reid, Foster and Homeless Youth Program Specialist, explained the Mt Diablo

Unified School District's Foster/HOPE Project. The goal of the program is to focus scholarship on Foster Youth, and students experiencing homelessness, and help them experience an educational environment that builds trust between the adults, students, and a sense of inclusiveness and belonging. Students will experience culturally responsive practices and instruction, high expectations, equal access to educational opportunities, and their families will be engaged and empowered in authentic and



collaborative partnerships. Rosie is also overseeing and distributing the newly formed Art in a Box project.

About the Speaker

Rosie Reid is a Program Specialist for Foster and Homeless Youth in the Mt Diablo Unified School District who has taught English and English Language Development for 21 years.

She was named 2019 California Teacher of the Year and received a 2020 Teaching Tolerance Excellence in Teaching award for her work promoting equity in and outside the classroom.

Her experience as a mom of a multiracial family with a range of sexualities, academic abilities, and affinities has heightened her awareness of issues of equity and justice.

In August of 2023, she took on the role of Foster/McKinney-Vento Liaison for the Mt. Diablo Unified School District. She is excited about the task of expanding the reach and impact of these programs.

SAN FELIPE: Cervical Cancer

At the recent Rotary conference in Australia, **Torsten Jacobse**n told us that the effort on assisting in the eradication of preventable and treatable health pandemics was redirected to cervical cancer--a preventable and transmissible disease that kills hundreds of thousands of women worldwide some as young as 25 years old. **Dr. Richard Godfrey** wrote an extensive article on the subject in the September issue of the Rotary magazine and spearheaded huge projects in Nepal, Bolivia, Guatemala, and Kenya. Dr Godfrey is a member of Niles Rotary, a UCSF Associate Clinical Professor of Surgery, and he now practices primary care with PotaCare and the Ashland Free Clinic, following 35 years as a si



care with RotaCare and the Ashland Free Clinic, following 35 years as a surgical oncologist with Kaiser and Highland Hospital.

A new technique, using HPV genetic screening, is superior to Pap smears and diagnosis established diseases that eliminates the need for examinations. Positive cases can be treated in less than a minute. Torsten met up with Dr. Godfrey in San Felipe and a presentation was done at our partner club. Next followed a visit to the Cancer Clinic that has been in existence for over 15 years. Dr. Godfrey was extremely impressed with the facility and especially with the vast knowledge of **Edith Fuentes Casillas**, the Director of the Cancer Center. The goal is to introduce the Ampfire diagnostic technique that will require raising about \$30K for equipment and reagents. Cost of treating a single women is about \$5. Much fun was had at several fundraising events.

SPONSOR A STUDENT: You Can Do it Now

Club Historian Rich Lueck wants you to know that if you want to donate before the end of



this year, you can. **The Gracie/Kuchy Sanchez Youth Education Matching Program** is an ongoing project of the Rotary Club of San Felipe and the Clayton Valley Concord Sunrise Rotary Club, supervised by the San Felipe Club's Youth Development Committee. This program is designed to assist the families of high school students of San Felipe, Baja California, Mexico. The cost to sponsor one student per year for a three-year high school is only \$250.00 USD per year. Your sponsorship will provide the required uniform including shoes, exam fees, school fees, books and school supplies each year. Sponsors are asked to commit for a student's entire three-year high school experience so that the sponsor and student continue together as one through graduation.

The requirements for the students to continue in this program include good attendance, seeking tutoring assistance, if necessary, no drugs or alcohol, participation in community service projects, good citizenship, and prompt completion of all assignments. The student's progress and performance are checked at mid-term and at the end of each semester.

We continually assist in the communication between students and sponsors through distribution of newsletters and by sending each sponsor a copy of their student's grades. We also hold an event in San Felipe each fall so that parents, students, sponsors, and Rotarians can all get together. Students and sponsors are also encouraged to communicate directly through letters, cards, or electronically. Mail the form directly or bring it to a meeting and we will mail your check.
